## Election Next Tuesday — VOTE!

### Democrats Lead Straw Poll Here

Any year that a major election takes place in the nation the Pinckney high school students, teachers, and faculty engage themselves in a "straw" election prior to the official election date. This year's election took place Monday and the results are as follows: Democratic Lyndon B. Johnson rated high over Republican Barry Goldwater, 172-34; then it was quite significant the voters jumped across the ballot to put Republican George Romney in office over Democrat Neil Staebler, 112-88. Sixty persons cast a straight Democratic ballot.

Frank J. Kelly won over Meyer Warshawsky for Attorney General, 158-38; Robert A. Derengoski won over William G. Millighan 112-88; for Lt. Governor: Secretary of State James Hare won over Allison Greene, 170-31; U.S. Senator Philip A. Hart received 161 votes over Ely M. Peterson's 42; and in the race for State Board of Education Mary Jean Kelley led all votes cast.

Don Gibson, P.H.S. instructor of Government claims this report may very well be used as a prediction of the November 3 election, and he adds, it is his prediction that Barry Goldwater will not carry in more than four states. The names of those states are Mississippi, Louisiana, Florida, and Arizona.

### Will Pick President, Governor, 3 Proposals

Voters in the Pinckney area will join the rest of the nation next Tuesday in electing a president, vice president, members of Congress, State and County officials and in townships the various offices will be filled, as well as a state referendum and two county propositions. It will be the largest number of candidates appearing on a ballot in a long time, and will not happen again as township and state elections will be staggered after this year.

Heading the list of candidates will be the electors of president and vice-president of the United States. There will be five slates of candidates but main interest will center on the Democrat and Republican contest with Lyndon B. Johnson and Hubert H. Humphrey being pitted against Barry Goldwater and William E. Miller.

Other parties on the ballot include a new one, Freedom Now Party, which is sponsored by Negroes, Socialist Workers, and Socialist Labor.

Governor George Romney, Republican, is opposed by Neil Staebler, Democrat candidate. For the

first time voters of Michigan will be voting for governor and lieutenant governor as one, as stipulated under the new Constitution. Romney's running mate is William Milliken and Staebler will be paired with Robert A. Derengoski.

Other State offices to be filled include secretary of state, with incumbent James Hare being opposed by Republican Allison Green. Attorney General Frank Kelley is opposed by Meyer Warshawsky, Republican.

United States Senator Philip A. Hart, Democrat, is opposed by Ely M. Peterson, Republican, the first time a woman has been a candidate for this office in Michigan.

This area will have a new Representative in Congress, as much as our present congressman, Charles Chamberlain, is no longer a resident of this new district. Candidates to be voted on are Weston Vivian, Democrat, and George Meader, incumbent Republican Congressman from Ann Arbor.

State Senator will offer Gerald Dunn, Democrat, and Gordon Rockwell, Republican.

Representative in State Legislature will offer Brighton's Brian Lavan on the Democrat ticket and incumbent Thomas G. Sharpe, Republican, of Howell.

Also to be voted upon will be two members of the State Board of Education for a two year term, two for four year term, two for six year term, and two for eight year term. This is a new board, the reason for the different terms.

Two members of the board of trustees of Michigan State University are to be elected, as are two members of the board of governors of Wayne State University.

County offices are as follows: Prosecuting Attorney: Martin J. Lavan (D), and Charles Gatesman (R).

Sheriff: Walter LaMoria (D), Lawrence Gehring (R). County Clerk: John McMillan (D), Joseph Ellis (R).

County Treasurer: Marjorie Mier (D), Dorothea Greer (R). Register of Deeds: Jack Shinn (D), Clarence Blackburn (R).

Drain Commissioner: Lyle Redinger (D), Clair Miller (R). Surveyor: Russell Cole (D), John Miller (R).

Three judges of the new Court of Appeals are to be elected and locally a probate judge, incumbent Francis Barron being opposed by Brighton's Donald Moon.

Three propositions will also appear on the ballot, the referendum on Act 240 PA 1964, commonly known as the Massachusetts Ballot, and a proposal to authorize a tax levy of 1 1/2 mills of the assessed valuation for a period of five years for county roads. Also a proposal to increase the tax rate limitation by 1 1/2 mills for five years for roads.

This was a "grudge" game left

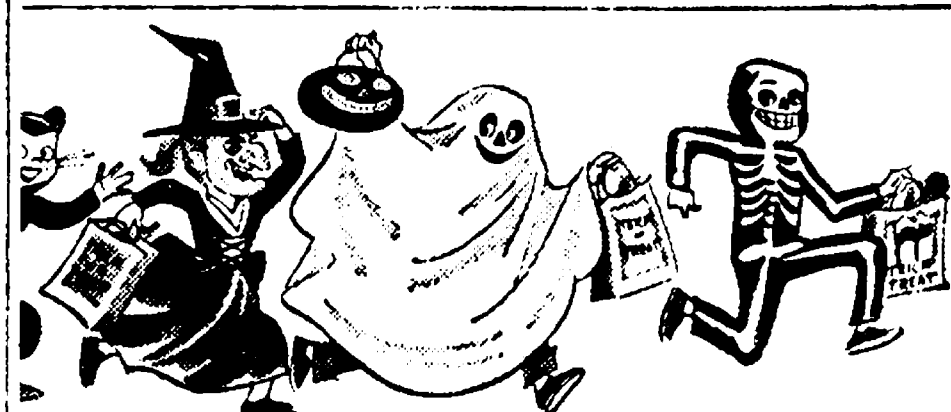

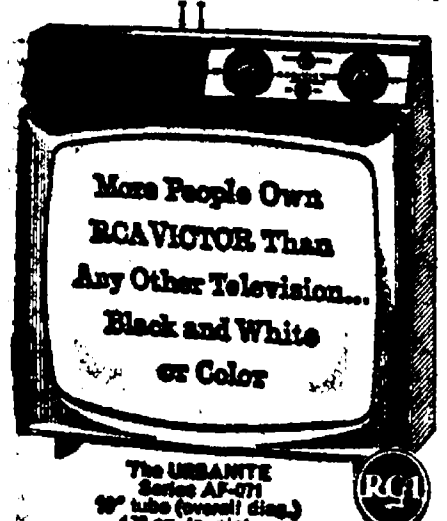

## Farm Census To Begin Nov. 9 In Livingston

Plans for taking the 1964 Census of Agriculture in Livingston County were announced today by Clement N. Charboneau, newly appointed census crew leader for the county.

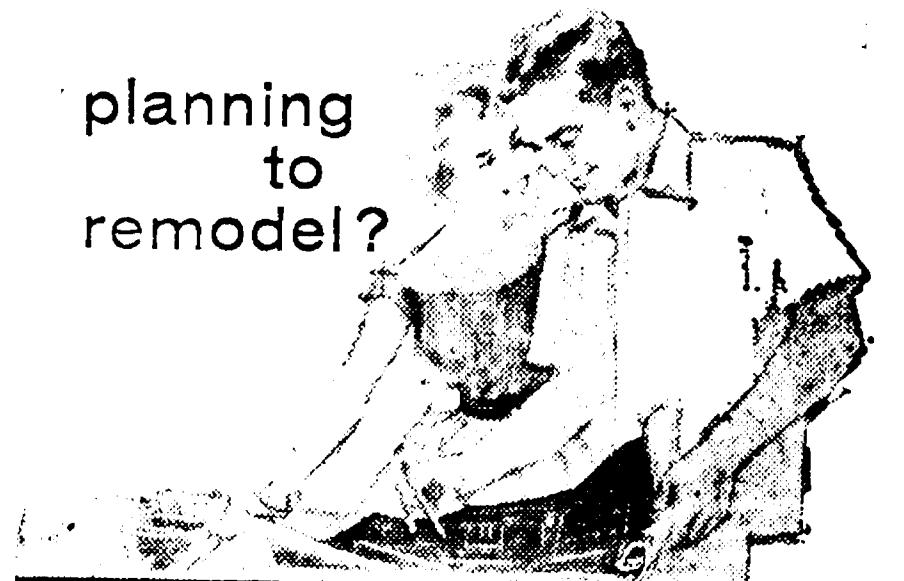
The job will be done in three stages, the crew leader said. First will come recruitment and training of enumerators to count all farms in the county. About one enumerator for each 150 farms will be needed.

Shortly after November 5, the

Bureau of the Census, an agency of the U.S. Department of Commerce, will start the second stage by mailing agricultural census questionnaires to all rural households in the county. This will give farm and ranch operators, who are required by law to fill out the forms, a period of time to consult their records and fill in answers to the questions.

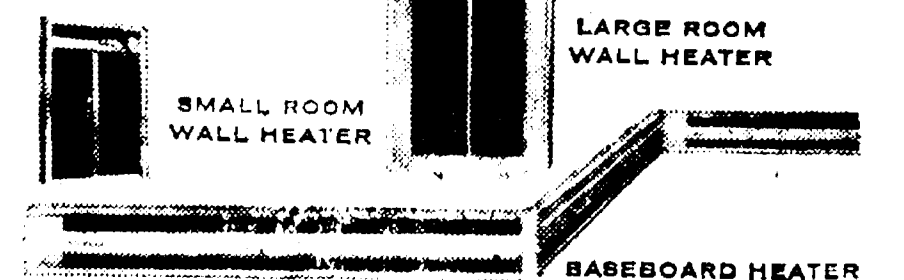
In the final stage, enumerators will visit each farm in the county to collect the questionnaires. At the time of this visit, the enumerators will help farmers complete answers to any questions the farmers may have had difficulty with. Enumerator visits are scheduled to begin in this county on November 9. Enumerators will take about three weeks to complete their work, the crew leader estimates.

## Christmas Package For Abroad Must Be Mailed Soon

Persons planning to mail Christmas packages to service men overseas and to friends abroad should be thinking now about getting the items into the mail. In order to assure receipt before Christmas packages should be mailed by the following dates: Nov. 10, to South & Central America.  
Nov. 10 to Europe.  
Nov. 1, to Africa.  
Nov. 1, Near East.  
Oct. 15 to Nov. 1, Far East.  
The same is true for Christmas cards, according to Postmaster Al Bosworth.

The department says that packages should be of wood, metal, solid-faced fiberboard or strong double-faced, corrugated fiberboard. The fiberboard containers should be wrapped in heavy paper to augment package strength.

All packages should be tied with strong cord. Completely filled or tightly packed packages, including use of cushioning material is advised. In case a package is torn, it is always advisable to place a slip of paper listing contents and the addressee and sender, inside the package. Postmaster Bosworth pointed out that packages for some destinations require customs declarations and that questions in this respect may be answered by calls to the local Post Office AC 9-6463.
