## Democrats Lead Straw Poll Here

Any year that a major election takes place in the nation the Pinckney high school students, teachers, and faculty engage themselves in a "straw" election prior to the official election date This year's election took place Monday and the results are as follows: Democratic Lyndon B. Johnson rated high over Republiean Barry Goldwater, 172-34; then it was quite significant the voters jumped across the ballot to put Republican George Romney in office over Democrat Neil Staebler, 112-88.
