Will Demonstrate 'New' Math

Elementary Teachers Write NBC Second Protest Letter

"We regret that you took exception to the classroom scene on our 'Kentucky Jones' program, but I wish to point out that this is a comedy series and as such, we believe, it should be permitted the humorous exaggeration which is one of the techniques of this form of entertainment. I think you would agree that comedy would scarcely be possible of attainment if it were to be restricted to a precisely accurate portrayal of reality."

The preceding is an excerpt from a letter written in the office that is responsible for notations and recordings of audience reaction to network programming for the National Broadcasting Co., and addressed to the Pinckney Elementary School teachers who sent NBC a letter protesting the "Kentucky Jones" TV show of September 26. Sixteen teachers claimed the show to be a "monstrous misconception" of the American philosophy of education. The show portrayed of how a little Chinese boy burned his abacus in front of his teacher, "so that he might become a true part of American educational life."

In the letter signed by the Elementary faculty a request was made for "public apology to American educators who have been dedicating their lives to understanding all children."

"The very core of our protest lies in our disagreement with N.B.C. that this can be allowed to pass under the guise of humorous entertainment.

Miss Cole points out to us that N.B.C. has a fine program in "Mr. Novak" produced with consultation with the National Education Association. We are in agreement with this statement. However, we think production of Mr. Novak has nothing to do with our protest.

"We still believe that this program was Un-American, exceptionally so, and that N.B.C. still owes an apology to Americans including American Educators.

National Retarded Children's Week Set for Nov. 15 - 26

Public and private tributes to the late President John F. Kennedy are requested during National Retarded Children's Week Nov. 15-26.

A special message has been issued from the White House by Dr. Stafford L. Warren, special assistant to the president for Mental Retardation. Dr. Warren reminds us that it was President Kennedy more than any other single person who took the retarded by the hand to lead them from the attics and into the schools, the businesses and the playgrounds of their own communities.

In 1961 President Kennedy appointed a panel on Mental Retardation to study the problem and offer recommendations for an all-out attack on it. Following the panel's report late in 1962, legislation was inaugurated, and before his death, the President had signed two major bills establishing a national program to combat mental retardation.

Captures Man After Hard Chase

Brighton's normally quiet night was shattered early Thursday morning when a State Trooper from the Brighton Post shot three times in attempting to stop a suspected automobile thief on Grand River Avenue in the heart of downtown.

At 1:30 a.m. a Hamburg motorist passing through Brighton saw a new Mercury car being driven out the back door of James Morzan & Sons garage in a very erratic manner.

He notified the State Police of the incident and Troopers Jack Shell and William Burns investigated. As they approached the garage they saw someone in a new Mercury at the rear door still inside the building.

As the trooper entered the back door the thief ran out the front and Trooper Shell started pursuing him down Grand River street. As they reached Main Street, Shell fired a shot into the air but the thief continued on and ran in back of the Sportsman Grill.

Coming out to Grand River again, Trooper Shell fired more in the air, but the thief, pointed down the street as they neared North Street Shell fired once again, this time aiming at the man's legs.

The bullet struck the sidewalk and ricocheted up through a plate glass in the Detroit Edison office, glanced off a water heater and hit a ventilator on the south wall, where it dropped to the floor.

The thief continued running up North Street and around the rear of Adolph Martin's blacksmith shop and between the Lavan Building and Pone's liquor store. This is a dead-end passageway and he was captured.

Frank E. Miklos, Jr., 21, of 6541 Academy Drive, Brighton, was arraigned before Justice of the Peace Eric Singer on a charge of breaking and entering. He denied the charge and demanded examination, which was set for Nov. 23 and in lieu of \$10,000 bond, is now lodged in the county jail.

Census Reveals Less Farms in Livingston

The 1964 Census of Agriculture, now being conducted by the Bureau of the Census, U. S. Department of Commerce, in Livingston County, will bring up to date farm statistics last collected in 1959.

Here are a few of the many facts recorded in the 1959 farm census for this County:

There were 1,497 farms in 1959, compared with 1,829 in 1954. The average size farm was 153.3 acres in 1959, compared with 142.3 acres in 1954.

The value of products sold by County's farmers in 1959 was \$9,381,832. The value of all crops sold was \$2,568,190. The value of all livestock and livestock products sold was \$6,813,642.

The 1964 national Census of Agriculture is the 18th in a series which began in 1940. Because of the rapid changes American agriculture has been undergoing in recent years, Census Bureau officials regard the current census as one of the most significant ever taken. They ask every farmer to cooperate in compiling an accurate record of these changes by filling out the census form he receives in the mail and holding the completed questionnaire until a census taker calls for it.

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Private Firm Will Mow County Roads

A trial project which may result in having private contractors cut the grass on all Michigan freeways was announced today by the Michigan State Highway Department.

State Highway Commissioner John C. Mackie said the Brencal Contractors, Inc., of Detroit, has been awarded four contracts totaling \$29,064 to mow the median strip and other landscaped areas along 87 miles of freeway in Livingston, Ingham and Clinton Counties.

Mackie said the Detroit firm, which submitted the lowest of nine bids on the work, will mow approximately 675 acres of landscaped area three times a year during 1965 and 1966.

It marks the first time the State Highway Department has awarded contracts for roadside mowing to a private contractor. In the past, this work has been done by either the State Highway Department or county road commission crews.

If successful the trial project . . . expected to save the State Highway Department approximately 20 per cent annually . . . will be expanded to cover roadside mowing on the state's more than 1,200 miles of freeway, Mackie said.

Brencal will mow 61 miles of I-96 between the Oakland-Livingston County line and M-100 west of Lansing in Clinton and 26 miles of US 23 in Livingston County.

Private Firm Will Mow County Roads

A trial project which may result in having private contractors cut the grass on all Michigan freeways was announced today by the Michigan State Highway Department.

State Highway Commissioner John C. Mackie said the Brencal Contractors, Inc., of Detroit, has been awarded four contracts totaling \$29,064 to mow the median strip and other landscaped areas along 87 miles of freeway in Livingston, Ingham and Clinton Counties.

Mackie said the Detroit firm, which submitted the lowest of nine bids on the work, will mow approximately 675 acres of landscaped area three times a year during 1965 and 1966.

It marks the first time the State Highway Department has awarded contracts for roadside mowing to a private contractor. In the past, this work has been done by either the State Highway Department or county road commission crews.

If successful the trial project is expected to save the State Highway Department approximately 20 per cent annually. It will be expanded to cover roadside mowing on the state's more than 1,200 miles of freeway, Mackie said.

Brencal will mow 61 miles of 1.96 between the Oakland-Livingston County line and M-100 west of Lansing in Clinton and 26 miles of US-23 in Livingston County.

The regular meeting of the Brighton Township Board was called to order at 8:00 p.m. by Supervisor Robert Beers. Present: Beers, Ernst, Schmatdke, Young, Corrigan and Attorney Brennan.

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

Board Minutes of the Brighton Area Schools

October 26, 1964

A special meeting of the Brighton Area Schools was held at the Miller school on October 26, 1964. All members were present except Mr. Probst and Mr. Leith. Mr. Hawkins, Mr. Fitzgerald and school architect Charles Scurlock were also present.

The meeting was opened at 8:00 p.m. by vice-president R. D. Lew-Allen. The minutes of the October 12, 1964 meeting were read and approved after minor corrections.

Guests present were — Mr. Clink, Livingston County Road Commission representative, Mrs. Heideman, Phil Krupa and Mary Ann Belyea.

Mr. Clink, of the Livingston County Road Commission appeared here to explain to the board and visitors the five year County road program. The road commission is asking 1 1/2 mills for this program which is to be on the ballot at the November 3rd election. Mr. Clink stated that the program needs all the support it can get and is his reason for coming to the meeting. All persons present agreed that Livingston County is in dire need of road improvement, but the board feels that as a board it should not take a stand one way or another in the form of a resolution.

Mr. Don Leith, Sr., has gone to Florida and asks about the responsibility for the property during his absence.
Some members feel that the school was, from the position of ownership, responsible at the time the contract was signed by the board and Mr. Leith Sr. It is thought that a legal opinion on this matter should be obtained from our attorney as soon as possible.

Mr. Scurlock was present to explain to the board and guests the latest high school plans as drawn. Mr. Leith arrived at this time (8:42 P.M.).
A discussion followed concerning the general basic layout of the high school building.
Mr. Probst arrived at this time (9:25 P.M.).

Several questions were asked concerning the basic layout of the building, design, changes that could be made etc.

Mr. Scurlock stated Seventh Street is the logical general entrance for the site and would like clarification as to its use for buses.

Mr. Scurlock would like approval to continue development with the basic plan as presented by him at this date.
At this time the meeting was turned over to Mr. Probst. A discussion followed concerning parking and entrances to the new school property. A suggestion was made to meet with the City Council to get a definite answer concerning the schools use of Seventh Street to school entrances. Mr. Probst will arrange to get the board on the Agenda for a meeting with the City Council.

Bids were read for repair of the front of the high school building.

2. School enrollment is up approximately 12%.

3. Mr. Hawkins read a new House bill entitled Enrolled House Bill No. 623, Article G, concerning time off from public school for religious instruction classes.

4. The board reaffirmed Mr. Hawkins decision to not use the service of "Efficiency Consultant Companies".

5. Dr. Davis reported he has received complaints from parents concerning small children crossing Main St. from N. Church St. without assistance. It was explained by Mr. Hawkins and Mr. Lew-Allen that school administrators have no authority to assign students or school personnel as street patrol people. There is no insurance to cover them.
A discussion of the new high school building was again brought up. Mr. Hawkins and Mr. Fitzgerald stated that in general the layout of the classrooms is satisfactory as presented by Mr. Scurlock.

Mr. LewAllen gave a short report of the meeting of the Constituent schools district of Livingston County. Mr. Phil Krupa was nominated to serve on the Intermediate School District Board's study committee.

Cat Shows

If you decide to show your cat, you will definitely want to join a club in your locality. There are several national associations, each with its own member clubs. Each association has slightly different rules governing shows, so the rules of the association under whose sponsorship the show is held will apply to your cat's entry. For example, the Purina Pet Care Center experts offer you the following brief descriptions of some of the classes judged in one association's show:

KITTEN CLASS: Any male, female or neuter kitten that is not less than four months of age, or more than eight months is eligible for entry in this class.

NOVICE CLASS: This group includes any cat that is more than eight months of age and has not previously won a first prize in a novice or open class at any show.

OPEN CLASS: All cats eight months or older that have not completed their championship may be entered.

CHAMPIONSHIP CLASS: Cats that have completed their championships, and have had their championships confirmed, may compete in this class.

NEUTER CLASS: Altered male cats over eight months of age may be entered in this group. No championship points are received.

SPAY CLASS: Spayed females over eight months of age may enter and compete in this class. They do not receive championship points.

HOUSEHOLD PET CLASS: Any cat, of a mixed color, long-hair or short-hair, cross-bred or of incidental breeding, is eligible to compete in this class. Cats entered in this class do not earn championship points.

For more specific information, ask your local club or write to the association of which your club is a member.

Combating the Birch Leaf Miner

The tender leaves of early planted "hardy" birches as well as grey and white-barked birches are prey to a very injurious pest—the birch leaf miner.




