Jim Pine, Jim Kourt, and Alan Steffen have been named to the Ingham County League All-conference team and will receive medals for this honor. This announcement followed a meeting of the coaches from the six league schools last week. No coach could vote for players on his own team, and a player required four or more votes to be in.

Jim Pine, 6'2", 170 pound minor, did some fine blocking and pass receiving. He caught TD passes of 22, 47, 42, 35, 20, and 25 yards.

Senior Alan Steffen, 6'1", 180 pound tackle, played a rugged game each week, with good blocking and strong tackling.

Guard, Jim Kourt, 6'3", 230 pound sophomore made a lot of holes in the center of the line for the Pirates this season.

This year offensive and defensive all-league teams were

selected rather than one team with honorable mentions. The unanimous selections included Jim Kourt, guard (Pinckney) and Mike Honey, halfback (Williamston) on the defensive team and Dave Southwick, center (Leslie) Duane Herbert, guard, Dave Copeland, quarterback, and Gregg Braun, halfback (all of Fowlerville) were selected to the offensive team. Two players were selected on both the defensive and offensive team. They were Braun and Herbert of Fowlerville, Jack Prince fullback (Danville), Dave Grainger, linebacker (Williamston) and Jim Kourt, guard (Pinckney) were the three sophomores selected to the all-league team. Kourt at 6'3" and 230 pounds was the biggest man on the team. Alan Grostic (Fowlerville) Dale Dillingham (Danville) and Bob Sooy (Stockbridge) were the juniors selected to the team.

Enumerators Named For Farm Census

Enumerators have been named in Livingston county for the 1964 Census of Agriculture. Crew Leader Clement N. Charboneau said today.

Enumerators in Livingston county belong to a force of 23,000 throughout the nation employed temporarily by the U. S. Bureau of the Census for this year's Census of Agriculture.

Enumerators are key workers in an agricultural census. It is the enumerator's responsibility to locate every farm within an enumeration district assigned to him (or her), determine if the operator of the farm has answered all questions on a questionnaire that will be mailed to the farmer by the Census Bureau, help the farmer complete any unanswered questions on the form, check answers for accuracy, and deliver the form to the Census Bureau.

A Census of Agriculture is taken every five years in the years (See Farm Census, page 11)

Democrat Nominees Met Thursday Night

Acting on advice from Livingston County Prosecuting Attorney Charles B. Gatesman that the Livingston County Executive Committee consists of those persons elected in the primaries as county nominees for office, the Democratic Executive Committee met Thursday evening in the Brighton State Bank.

A letter from Joseph H. Ellis, Livingston County Clerk, was read with an attached letter from Gatesman. In his letter Ellis asked that Gatesman check "the various documents on file in my office, and as legal counsel for all county officials, please advise me as to the proper group to certify, if any."

Gatesman's letter read, in part, as follows:

"I have checked the documents on file in your office and, in addition, have gone over the statute involved, to wit: M.S.A. 6.1599; I have also checked with the Michigan State Democratic Central Committee.

"The statute in question states that the County Executive Com-

that neither Livingston County delegation would be seated at this convention.

"From this, I must assume that the Michigan State Democratic Party did not consider the Livingston County Democratic convention to be a legally constituted convention. Conservation Notes

About 87 percent of the state's population, seven percent of its deer herd, and 100,000 farms are found in southern Michigan, according to the Conservation Department.

This would seem to be a reasonable mixture of whitetails and people. Deer are welcome additions to the scenery. They are providing more and more recreation, both for hunters and for people who just like to see them. But these whitetails are like hot pepper; a little is good but too much can give you fits. The southern herd is growing, and right now it has reached the trouble stage in many localities.

Deer damage to crops, orchards, and ornamental nurseries amounted to well over one-third of a million dollars last year. On top of that, more deer are killed by cars in southern Michigan than in either of the state's two northern regions.

Grooming Your Cat

Cats are fastidious animals and groom themselves with their tongues. However, they still require daily brushing and combing. Five minutes grooming each day will assure your cat a sleek, handsome coat, and do away with shedding. If loose hair is not removed, the cat will swallow it and form hairballs in the stomach and digestive tract. Begin grooming your cat when he is a kitten and he will become accustomed to the daily routine. Place the cat on your lap, or if you find it easier, place him on a table or floor where he can move around as he is brushed. First, brush against the grain of his fur to catch loose hair. There are some cats with "sensitive skins" who find brushing against the grain of the fur highly irritating. If your cat is one of these, brush with the grain only. Then brush downwards in short strokes. Occasionally, pull loose fur from the brush and dispose of it where the cat cannot get to it and eat it. Brush the entire body until all loose hair is removed.

The rubber or plastic combs for short-haired cats' long hairs require a strong metal comb to prevent or prevent tangles.

The Anna Pet Care Center experts state that cats only when a comb is necessary. Most of the time, they themselves clean a comb is unnecessary.

If your cat is very dusty, wipe him with a towel and then brush and comb until he is quite dry. On the occasions when he must be bathed, use only warm water and a mild, unperfumed soap, never a strong detergent.

The shop was built in October 1831, the first horse shoe set November 15th and the first oxen shod December 4, 1831 while Michigan was yet a territory of the U.S.A.

ending in "4" and "9" to gather needed, up-to-date information on the nation's agriculture resources and production. Such information is vital in making decisions affecting many segments of the U. S. economy. Data gathered include the number and size of farms, acreage and harvest of crops, livestock inventory, information on farm equipment and improvements, farm products sold, and on some production expenditures. Information also will be collected on use of fertilizers, insecticides, and herbicides.

The enumerators will be trained in a special 4-day home study course designed to prepare them for the farm census, their crew leader said.

Cat Shows
If you decide to show your cat, you will definitely want to join a club in your locality. There are several national associations, each with its own member club. Each association has slightly different rules governing shows, so the rules of the association under whose sponsorship the show is held will apply to your cat's entry. For example, the Puma Pet Care Center reports offering you the following brief descriptions of some of the classes judged in one association's show: **KITTEN CLASS:** Any male, female or neuter kitten that is not less than four months of age, or more than eight months is eligible for entry in this class. **NOVICE CLASS:** This group includes any cat that is more than eight months of age and has not previously won a first prize in a novice or open class at any show. **OPEN CLASS:** All cats eight months or older that have not completed their championship may be entered. **CHAMPIONSHIP CLASS:** Cats that have completed their championships, and have had their championships confirmed, may compete in this class. **NEUTER CLASS:** Altered male cats over eight months of age may be entered in this group. No championship points are received. **SPAY CLASS:** Spayed females over eight months of age may enter and compete in this class. They do not receive championship points. **HOUSEHOLD PET CLASS:** Any cat, of a mixed color, long-hair or short-hair, cross-bred or of incidental breeding, is eligible to compete in this class. Cats entered in this class do not earn championship points. For more specific information, ask your local club or write to the Puma Pet Care Center, P.O. Box 100, Brighton, Michigan 48116.
