## 3 Killed in County in Thanksgiving Crash

Three young persons were instantly killed when the car in which they were riding shortly before midnight Thursday went out of control on M-106 east of Stockbridge and struck a tree. Scene of the accident is on the extreme western part of Livingston county and the accident was handled by the sheriff's department.

Two 16-year-old girls from Stockbridge, Connie Ranck and Marcia Sweet, and John Murray, 23, of Munith, were the victims. Another youth in the car, Don Rindaman, 17, is in fair condition at an Ann Arbor hospital.

This brings Livingston county's fatalities to 25 for the year, and helped to swell Michigan's record for the Thanksgiving week end

when 23 persons lost their lives in traffic.

Three persons were injured Thanksgiving Day when their car rolled over on Kensington Road at Silver Lake Road. The driver, George Green, of Garden City, told State Police he was going too fast to stop for the stop sign there and went into a skid.

Riding with him were Peggy and Bobby McSwain of Plymouth, who were taken to a Livonia hospital with back injuries. The car skidded 218 feet before rolling over.

The Livingston county accident report from Nov. 23 to the 30 records 27 property damage accidents, 10 personal injury accidents, in which 24 persons were injured, 3 fatalities, and 47 automobiles were involved.

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A Red Cross Mobile Blood Bank unit will be in Pinckney Wednesday, December 9, at Pilgrim Hall, from 12 noon until 6 p.m.

Mrs. Henry Gilbertson, 11337 Algonquin Drive, Pinckney, is responsible for arrangements being made that the unit's visit to Pinckney might be successful.

Mrs. Gilbertson stresses the fact that the Livingston County blood bank urgently needs blood to replenish the depleted supply available to the community, and urges all area residents to avail themselves to this service being brought here for their convenience.

If anyone, a friend, a neighbor or relative living in this county urgently needs blood and a person goes to the hospital to donate, a lab charge is added to the patient's bill. Through the Red Cross Mobile unit, a person can give blood for such emergencies without cost, and the blood is on hand in case of emergencies.

Eligible donors must be persons from 18 through 50 years of age, in good health, weighing over 110 lbs., and having had no surgery, receiving blood or blood plasma within the last six months. Single persons, or persons under the age of 21, must have the written consent of their parent or guardian.

## Post Office Extends Service For Christmas

Postmaster Lawrence E. Baughn announces that the Pinckney post office will have an increase of Saturday service. To facilitate early Christmas mailing the post office hours will be extended to 5:30 p.m. on Saturday, December 12, and Saturday, December 13.

"A little planning now will help avoid the Christmas Rush," Postmaster Lawrence Baughn said today.

The Pinckney postmaster has some tips which will not only put ZIP into Christmas mailing, but will help local postal employees move the record-breaking mountain of mail that is expected this Christmas season.

1. Find last year's Christmas mailing list. If you don't find it, or didn't have one, make one now.

2. Check to see that all addresses are correct. The phone book is usually a good source for local addresses. However, remember that the local delivery area includes parts of six different telephone exchanges.

3. Whenever possible, add the ZIP Code to the addresses on the list. The Pinckney ZIP Code is 48169. Always include your ZIP Code in your return addresses. This is the best way to inform friends, relatives and business associates of the code number for your area.

4. Determine your list of gift purchases which must be mailed. Such planning allows you to shop early when selections are greatest and you can stock up on mailing materials in advance. Be sure to purchase enough mailing material so that your parcels can be packed securely.

5. MAIL EARLY. The Postmaster emphasized that poorly wrapped and loosely packed cartons are the major cause of parcel post damage. He also suggested that the address be placed on only one side of the exterior wrapping and that a duplicate address be included inside the carton, along with a list of the contents. This will assist in delivery in case the wrapper is not secure or the parcel becomes damaged.

Mr. Baughn said that the Post Office Department in Washington is predicting that a record seven billion pieces of mail will move through the postal system during the peak rush just before Christmas.

"The cooperation of all mailers is vital for us to deliver each holiday greeting, letter and package before Christmas Day. A little planning and doing now will make the Christmas rush less hectic for everyone," he said.

## Farmers Are Urged To Visit Polls At 8 P.M.

Farmers today got a "last-minute" reminder about important elections which will be held in Livingston County on December 10th. The elections are to choose ASC farmer-committeemen who will serve for the next year as local administrators of national farm-action programs.

These ASC committeemen have broad important program responsibilities, which makes it all the more urgent that representative farmers be elected to the job. All qualified voters are urged to cast their ballots.

Each year, such qualified voters — farmers who are taking part or are eligible to take part in one or more of the farm programs which the committeemen administer — elect a community committee from among their own number. The chairman, vice chairman, and regular member of this committee also serve respectively as delegate, alternate delegate, and second alternate delegate to a county convention, where the ASC county committee is elected.

Programs administered by the committeemen include the Agricultural Conservation Program, acreage allotments, commodity loans, the feed grain program, the voluntary wheat program, the National wool program, and farm storage facility loans. Other duties are assigned to the committeemen by the Secretary of Agriculture as the need arises.

In Livingston County, eligible voters will cast ballots for community committeemen at a meeting held for that purpose.

## PICNIC GROUNDS NOT ALWAYS GOLDMINE

Farmers and rural landowners, thinking of making hay on the current boom in outdoor recreation might well take a look at a recent study in Ohio, according to the National Wildlife Federation. In a survey of privately-owned woodland picnic areas, Dwight McCurdy of the Central States Forest Experiment Station found more than one-third of the operators lost money in 1962. The more successful enterprises were within 30 to 40 minutes drive of a population center, were better financed and offered a variety of other activities such as outdoor game areas, boating, fishing and swimming. A major management problem for the owners is keeping their areas neat and clean. Many of the less successful operators recognized the lack of facilities limits their profit-making opportunities but stated they lacked sufficient capital to expand.

The Hamburg Garage was opened in 1914 by the late J. W. Winkelhaus and at that time was located in the tap room of the Hamburg Hotel, which he had purchased in 1903 and operated for years. The hotel offered a full course chicken dinner for 35 cents.

After Livingston county was voted dry in 1909, he closed the bar but still operated the hotel and sold and assembled farm ma-

chinery and tested cream.

In 1914 he opened an authorized Ford garage and car sales in what was the old tap room, thus accounting for the beautiful ceramic tile floor in a garage. He not only sold Fords, but at one time traded a Model T Ford truck for a piece of property on the Huron River.

Since his death in 1953 the business has been owned and operated by his son Ralph. In December of 1960 the business was moved to its present location, less than a mile from its origin.

Mr. Winkelhaus is proud of his business which has been owned and operated by one family for 50 years. He invites everyone to the open house.


