School Board Approves \$7,000 for Play Area

Rural Patrons Must Keep Boxes Clear of Snow

Winter is here and with it comes the unpleasant task of snow removal. Postmaster Lawrence Baughn today reminded the rural patrons of the Postal Regulation which requires that the approaches to rural boxes be kept cleared at all times. This includes the removal of snow.

The Postmaster invites rural patrons to look at the problem from the carrier's point of view. He said, "Our carriers desire to deliver every piece of mail that they can but if the carrier gets stuck at your box the mail for all his other patrons will be delayed plus the expense of a tow truck or the extra work of shoveling his way out."

The Pinckney Community School Board has approved spending \$7,000 for the purchasing of eight acres of property at the east side adjacent to the present elementary school grounds for additional play area.

Immediate possession will be taken making a "long time dream come true" for the Elementary administration and faculty. The property was owned by the Armstrong family of Detroit. The building now standing on the property will be moved across the road come spring.

The \$7,000 was included in the bond issue passed by school district voters last January. At that time Mr. Armstrong raised his price another \$1,000 causing the Board to delay action. Through negotiations the Board finally acquired the property for the original offer.

The present Elementary school building sets on eight acres of property purchased from the Village of Pinckney in 1950 for \$1,000. The Village purchased it several years before that for "older boys" to play baseball, which at that time was not allowed within the Village limits on Sundays.

BLAZE DESTROYS HELL'S ONLY CHURCH

The first and only church in Hell has been destroyed by fire. The first service was scheduled for Sunday.


The "church" was a hall leased from a taxidermist. A hundred theater seats had been obtained

from a Grand Rapids church and were installed.

The Rev. Frank Shultz, a Baptist preacher, said he expected about 60 persons to attend the first services Sunday at the hall, renamed the First Baptist Church.

He said no one witnessed the fire which burned the structure to the ground.

Mr. Clark reports the auditorium will seat 260 worshippers, plus an overflow space when needed. There will be space for about 15 class rooms, Pastor's study, nursery, and a large fellowship hall for family dinners, etc.

teams scored 14 points. It didn't come of the game, but to those loyal Pinckney fans it might be worth a thought.

Miles Cone pulled down 12 of the Pirates' rebounds which was the most for either team.

The Pirates Junior Varsity lost to the Lions JV team 58-32, so the varsity wasn't alone.

The game scheduled for Friday against and at Darsville was postponed until February on account of bad weather which prevailed that day.

December 3, 1964

The minutes of the regular meeting of Nov. 5, 1964 and the special meeting of Nov. 11, 1964 were approved as read.

Mrs. Widmayer requested that the Board of Education consider the addition of privacy doors on the stalls of the boys toilet rooms at the Pinckney Elementary and the Winans Lake Elementary School. She also suggested that consideration be given to the placing of additional asphalt surface on the North and South sides of the Pinckney Elementary School.

Mr. Graff requested Board consideration with reference to the existing maintenance program and general appearance of the Pinckney Elementary School.

Mr. R. Weber and Mr. R. McCloskey were present.

Mr. R. Weber, President of the Pinckney Education Association, requested that the Board of Education consider the establishment of a Professional Negotiation Committee. This committee to consist of members of the faculty, staff and board.

Superintendent Report: The Special Education classrooms at Hamburg Elementary School are now filled. These rooms contain 15 students each.
Old Business: Motion by Kinsey seconded by Line that the

Armstrong property adjacent to the East side of the Pinckney Elementary School be purchased for the offered price of \$7,000.00. Motion carried.

Motion by Radloff seconded by Kinsey that a letter of recognition and commendation be sent to Mrs. D. Campbell. Motion carried.

New Business: Motion by Line seconded by Kinsey that a Professional Negotiation Committee be established. Motion carried. Mr. Kinsey, Mr. Line, Mr. Collier and Superintendent Reader will be members of this committee.

A discussion concerning the placing of doors on the boys toilet stalls at the Pinckney Elementary School and the Winans Lake Elementary School was held. Mr. Reader was directed to review this situation and report for consideration at a future meeting. In addition, Mr. Reader was directed to determine the feasibility or necessity of additional asphalt surface in front of the Pinckney Elementary School.

The maintenance program at the Pinckney Elementary School was discussed. Mr. Reader will report on this situation at a future meeting.

Motion by Collier seconded by Line that bills be paid as presented. Motion carried.

Motion by Kinsey seconded by Line that meeting be adjourned. Motion carried. Time 10:20 P.M.

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

Your New Kitten

During his first day at home with you, your new kitten has many adjustments to make, and may be bewildered by his strange surroundings. Resist the temptation to pet and play with him for long periods of time. An overly tired kitten becomes nervous and more susceptible to disease. Kittens, like any other young creature, require a great deal of sleep.

Let your new kitten explore at his own pace. But be sure to place his litter pan and a shallow bowl containing water in what ever spot you intend him to be hereafter. In this way, the kitten will soon learn where to find them.

A child must learn by instruction and example to enjoy a kitten without mauling or hurting it. Also, neither a kitten nor a cat should be disturbed while eating or sleeping.

Make sure to find a reputable veterinarian at the same time you find your kitten. Howell State Hospital Announces Opening of Out-Patient Clinic

Dr. Marion J. Skowronski, Superintendent of Howell State Hospital, announces the opening of the Howell State Hospital Out-Patient Clinic in the B Building on the Hospital grounds.

The Out-Patient Clinic program is the outgrowth of a project which was started in August 1962. At that time Dr. Skowronski and his staff were interested to explore the possibility that Livingston County families with a retarded child living at home would welcome the services which the Howell State Hospital staff could offer on an Out-Patient basis.

In the subsequent two-year period, approximately 60 families have used the Hospital's Out-Patient services, which served to demonstrate the need for and value of the program. This demonstration prompted the State Department of Mental Health to allocate funds in the Howell State Hospital 1964-1965 budget to establish formally the Out-Patient Clinic, including additional staff, so that an expanded program is now possible.

The Howell State Hospital Out-Patient Clinic is in the main stream of the current trend to provide community based services to assist parents to understand and cope with the large and small family problems which arise from or are related to the presence of a mentally handicapped member of the household.

With such professional help available, many parents may be enabled to exercise their preference to keep their retarded child at home. Appointments from parents of mentally retarded children are invited. Clinic services: Phys. Out-Patient Clinic, Speech Therapy, Occupational Therapy, Psychological Testing, Educational Testing, and X-rays as indicated. Based on the findings of the Clinic study, the Clinic staff will continue to consult with parents about treatment recommendations which are appropriate to the individual family and the child.

The Clinic staff aims to work cooperatively with other community services such as Public Health, Family Department, County Health Department, social agencies and residential agencies.



Area's New Catholic Bishop To Be Installed Next Tuesday

The Most Rev. Alexander M. Zaleski, the new Coadjutor Bishop of the Lansing Catholic Diocese, will be formally welcomed to the Diocese in ceremonies to be held next Tuesday, Dec. 15.

Bishop Zaleski, who has been an Auxiliary Bishop in the Archdiocese of Detroit since 1950, succeeds Bishop Joseph H. Albers who asked to be relieved of his administrative duties because of his health.

Highlights of the reception for Bishop Zaleski will be Pontifical High Mass at St. Mary's Cathedral.

Present at the Mass, to be celebrated by Bishop Zaleski, will be Archbishop John F. Dearden of Detroit, more than a dozen Bishops from throughout the mid-west, several hundred priests and nuns as well as civic and public officials from the Lansing area.

The Mass will be followed by a luncheon at the Lansing Civic Center, Archbishop Dearden, Bishop Albers, Bishop Zaleski and Lansing Auxiliary Bishop M. Joseph Green will speak at the luncheon.

Bishop Zaleski was named Coadjutor Bishop of Lansing with right of succession by Pope Paul VI on Oct. 14 while he was in

Rome for the Ecumenical Council.

As Coadjutor Bishop, he will be Administrator of the 15-county Lansing Diocese which has a Catholic population of more than 200,000. Counties in the Lansing Diocese include Berrien, Branch, Calhoun, Cass, Clinton, Eaton, Genesee, Hillsdale, Ingham, Jackson, Kalamazoo, Livingston, Shiawassee, St. Joseph and Van Buren.

Postmaster Makes Recommendations To Postal Patrons

Postmaster Lawrence Baughn confidently predicts that the volume of Holiday mail will hit a record high during this year's Christmas rush. "Actually," he says, "the volume has been rising at the rate of nearly three percent a year for several years now and this is most strongly reflected around the holiday season."

The Pinckney postmaster claims that public cooperation is one very important reason that post offices around the country are able to handle this huge mountain of mail in such a short period of time. "Without the assistance of the public, we'd be in a jam. People who shop early and get their cards and parcels into the mail early make it possible for the holiday mails to be delivered on time. Imagine what it would be like if we were to get all the holiday mails the last week before Christmas?"

In addition to early mailing, the postmaster has several other recommendations which will help the postal employees do a better job moving this avalanche of mail. First, he recommends using ZIP Codes which help handle the mails faster because of a

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Deer Hunters Spent Over \$13 Million

Michigan deer hunters spent more than \$13 million on food, lodging and recreation during the 16-day season, according to preliminary figures from a Central Michigan University research study.
The survey of Michigan's overall tourist and recreational travel picture is being conducted under a special \$78,000 grant by the Michigan Legislature. The CMU Center for Economic Expansion is responsible for the study which is being coordinated with work being conducted at other Michigan universities.
Our preliminary survey of the impact of Michigan's deer season is based on more than 2,700 interviews among the 450,000 hunters and covers every type of accommodation," said Charles R. Owens, survey director.
"The dollar figure does not include money spent on transportation equipment and license sales."
We found the average party to be about four persons who hunt some five and a half days. We also found that the average hunter spends about \$30 during that five and a half days.
The 15-month-long survey will cover every season and is designed to give tourism officials a measuring stick to more accurately determine the value of Michigan's tourist industry.
The preliminary material which the Central Michigan study has developed has already given us some new insights into our industry and we are confident that that completed study will be of great value," said William T. McGraw, director of the Michigan tourist Council.
