

Mrs. Luella Ketchum found out recently how the transposition of numbers can make for a most embarrassing situation.



Consumers Power Co. Plans For \$92 Million Expansion In 1965

Consumers Power Company will invest more than \$92,000,000 during 1965 in expanding and improving its electric and natural gas service in 65 of the 68 counties in Michigan's lower peninsula. Planned construction represents the first phase of a four-year program in which Consumers Power plans to spend \$345,000,000 by the end of 1968.

Construction plans for 1965 were made public in a joint announcement by A. H. Aymond, chairman of the board, and James H. Campbell, president of Consumers Power.

"The 1965 Consumers construction program is continuing evidence that the Outstate Michigan service area of Consumers Power Company is busy, prosperous and rapidly growing," the two executives said. "Further, it is evident that we at Consumers Power are determined to keep pace with the strong economy of Michigan and its people."

Of the \$92,000,000 to be invested in 1965, the company plans to spend \$42,000,000 on expansion of its gas department, and \$8,000,000 on offices, service buildings, and related service equipment. In addition, the company's subsidiary, Michigan Gas Storage Company, will invest \$3,700,000 on projects related to Consumers natural gas service, bringing total expenditures by the two companies in 1965 to \$96,000,000.

The expansion program is being undertaken to keep pace with Michigan's rapid industrial growth. It is intended to increase Consumers' commercial generating capability from 2,970,000 kilowatts to 3,427,000 kilowatts by 1967, and to expand the company's supply of available natural gas from 186 billion cubic feet to 250 billion cubic feet in 1968.

Major gas department projects include the expansion of gas compressor facilities at Overisel, near Holland, St. Clair, near Port Huron, and White Pigeon, south of Kalamazoo. Compressor facilities are the "pumps" which speed gas through the pipelines to the ultimate consumer.

New gas transmission lines will be installed at a number of locations in the state, and natural gas distribution systems will be installed in the communities of Port Austin, Kinde, Ruth and Minden, in Michigan's Thumb area, in Dor, southwest of Holland, and at Pleasant Lake, north of Jackson. These communities are new to the company's gas service system.

Fourteen new gas regulator stations will be installed at various Outstate locations to help bring gas from the transmission lines to the distribution lines, and more than 500 miles of new gas distribution mains will be installed at various locations throughout the service area to improve service to old customers and bring service to new customers. The department expects to add 34,000 new gas customers to the company's lines during the year. Consumers Power presently serves 645,000 natural gas customers.

In addition to the gas compression, transmission and distribution projects, Consumers and Michigan Gas Storage plan to drill 50 new wells in various Michigan gas fields in 1965. These wells will include storage wells, field development wells and exploratory wells.

Consumers 1964 expansion and improvement program involved the investment of \$78,000,000. The company's headquarters are in Jackson.

Deduct Sales Tax On Your Income Tax

R. I. Nixon, Detroit District Director of Internal Revenue, today issued the following table for use in preparing 1964 Federal income tax returns. Mr. Nixon emphasized that the table has been revised and that any chart issued or published last year should not be used in preparing 1964 tax returns.

This table may be used as a guide to arrive at the average amount of Michigan State Sales Tax of 4% which may be claimed as a deduction in the absence of definite proof of payment. Mr. Nixon pointed out that the table takes into consideration taxes paid on the purchase of large household items, but does not include either gasoline tax of 6c per gallon or the sales tax on the purchase of an automobile. These items must be itemized separately and may be taken as a deduction in addition to the amount shown on the sales tax table.

Taxpayers are reminded also that the Michigan State tax on cigarettes is not deductible. Mr. Nixon suggested that taxpayers save this table for use when they prepare their tax return. Taxpayers having additional questions on this subject should telephone their

local Internal Revenue Service office.

AVERAGE STATE SALES TAX TABLE

This table is based on the Michigan general sales tax of 4 percent. It may be used when deducting sales tax on Form 1040. If the table is not used, other deductions must be limited and substantiated. Deductible sales tax on the purchase of automobiles and gasoline tax of 6 cents per gallon are not included in the table and must be itemized separately.



Aliens Must Report Address During January

Walter A. Sahli, District Director of the Immigration and Naturalization Service, Detroit, advised today that the annual alien address report program is again under way.

According to Mr. Sahli, 135,000 aliens reported addresses last year in the State of Michigan. The number this year is expected to be slightly smaller.

The Immigration official pointed out that the address reports are required by law and willful failure to comply with these requirements may lead to serious consequences.

Forms with which to make the reports are available at all Post Offices and Immigration and Naturalization Service offices. It is an easy matter to fill out one of the cards and return it to the same office.

Mr. Sahli added that trained personnel will be on hand in all offices of the Immigration and Naturalization Service to answer any questions the reporting aliens may have regarding immigration and naturalization matters. Sufficient trained personnel are not available to furnish this assistance in all Post Offices.
